THE CONSULAR SECTION OF THE BRITISH EMBASSY

Greetings once again!

In our ongoing effort to keep you updated, here are our latest updates and highlights.

In May, we saw 63,078 British nationals arriving in Thailand, which is a notable 26% drop from April.

Our dedicated team handled 147 new cases this month, including: 56 deaths, 33 hospitalisations, 31 welfare issues, 14 arrests and detentions, 12 missing persons and other case types such as victim of crims and child welfare.

Among these, 2 were related to road traffic accidents, making a total of 32 such cases so far this year.

With so many investment fund options available it's important to understand the key differences in this broad and often confusing marketplace.

Unit Trusts & Open-Ended Investment Companies

Two of the most common types of funds are Unit Trusts and Open-Ended Investment Companies (OEICs). They share many traits, but they also have some important differences.

Since they will always accept more cash from investors - they just become bigger to accommodate the demand. On the flip side, if there are more sellers than buyers, the fund will become smaller.

The price of a fund always reflects the value of its holdings. When more investors want to buy into the fund than sell, the manager issues more units. When the opposite is true, the manager cancels units.

They are more widely used even though some are more expensive than their investment trust alternatives. The great advantages of open-ended funds are their flexibility to make more units, as well as the fact there are more funds available meaning a greater choice for investors. This differs from a closed-ended fund, which issues a fixed number of non-redeemable shares like an Investment Trust.

What is a Unit Trust?

Unit Trusts were the first real open-ended investment fund in the UK, termed so because the fund manager can create new units (similar to shares) in the fund to meet investor demand. These units can be bought or sold at any time. This differs from a closed-ended fund like the Investment trust as mentioned above.

What is an OEIC?

In 1997, laws were introduced allowing the creation of OEICs, which are also open-ended. Over the last few decades OEICs have become a lot more common and many unit trusts have converted to the OEIC structure. This is due to the relative simplicity of OEICs and the fact they can broadly be sold into different countries across Europe.

Most new funds that are launched are structured as OEICs particularly in the UK.

What's the difference between Unit Trusts and OEICs?

In many respects unit trusts and OEICs are the same. They are both open-ended and the price of each unit depends on the net asset value of the fund's investment portfolio. Both allow you to choose to have dividends paid to you as income or reinvested in the fund and both can invest in a wide range of asset classes, locations and sectors.

A subtle difference is a unit trust is governed by trust law, whereas an OEIC is governed by company law. Technically, this means investors in a unit trust are not owners of the underlying assets, unlike investors in an OEIC although in reality this makes little difference to investors. If you invest in a unit trust you buy units whereas if you invest in an OEIC you buy shares.

The major difference between unit trusts and OEICs is the way they're priced. Unit trusts quote a bid price and an offer price; OEICs only quote one price. With unit trusts, the bid price is the per-unit price you'll receive if you sell your units back to the fund company. It's usually based on the bid price of the underlying securities held by the fund.

Investment Trusts

Investment trusts are effectively companies that hold assets such as shares. They are run by a fund manager backed by an independent board acting in the best interests of shareholders. The company itself is listed on the London Stock Exchange. While investment trusts predominantly invest in the shares of other companies, they can also invest in other financial assets.

As mentioned, as a closed ended fund, investment trusts have a fixed number of shares in an issue. This allows managers to take a longer-term view because they do not have to sell assets when investors sell their shares. Investment trusts have some of the unique features that set them aside from other types of funds.

Income seekers may be interested to know that investment trusts can hold back up to 15% of income generated by underlying assets each year to build up a reserve to be used to smooth dividend payments in tougher times. This means investors can enjoy a steady income when markets are performing. In certain circumstances, investment company boards may elect to pay income out of capital. While this can erode the long-term capital returns generated by the funds many investors are happy to prioritise short-term income payments over longer term growth.

Some growth investors might be interested in another unusual feature which allows investment trusts to borrow. This means that if managers think there is value in a particular market, they can borrow money to use for further investments, known as 'gearing'.

In a rising market, returns from an investment trust can be magnified because gearing means managers are better able to take advantage of rising share prices.

However, when share prices fall, the losses of geared funds can be exaggerated. The pricing of investment trusts works in a unique way too. When the price is greater than the value of the assets held in the company, this is known as a premium. At a time it is lower it is known as a discount.

Exchange-Traded Funds (ETFs)

An ETF is called an exchange-traded fund because it's traded on an exchange just like stocks. The price of an ETF's shares will change throughout the trading day as the shares are bought and sold on the market. This is unlike mutual funds, which are not traded on an exchange, and which trade only once per day after the markets close. Additionally, ETFs tend to be cheaper and more liquid when compared to mutual funds like unit trusts and OEICS.

An ETF can also hold multiple underlying assets and as such are also a popular choice for diversification. The assets can include stocks, commodities, bonds, or a mixture of investment types. Some ETFs focus on only U.S. offerings, while others have a global outlook.

There are many investment options available and a number of ways of holding these investments. They can be purchased by the public directly though Trading Accounts or through Investment Advisers.


Our Naval Year

This was an amazing year for our Naval history with the crews of seven ships taking advantage of the use our facilities whilst docked in Bangkok. The year started in January, with HMAS Parramatta (DE 46), a Riverclass destroyer escort. In April, HMAS Vendetta (D08), a Daring-class destroyer, visited us and its plaque is on display in the Churchill Bar.

In July, we had the crews of HMS Scylla (F71) and HMS Danae (F47), both Leander-class frigates, and HMS Londonderry (F108) a Rothesay class anti-submarine frigate. The Club arranged two soccer matches using the Port of Thailand Authority's ground sadly we lost against HMS Londonderry 4-1 and against HMS Scylla 3-1!

In early November, we hosted HMNZS Taranaki (F148), a modified Rothesay-class frigate and a few weeks later, HMS Chichester (F59), a Salisbury-class or type 61 aircraft direction frigate, recently refitted as a Hong

Kong guard ship. This visit included a soccer match as well ... which the Club won 3 goals to nil.

Sporting Matters

In January, the Darts Section requested to formally join the Bangkok Darts League with weekly darts to be played each Thursday in The Bar (in 2024, this is Veranda). Over the next year the Section played against formidable teams from 20 Hotel, Siam Dyeing, Wallaby's, Marios, The Pub, Other Office and ... Uranus.

Although not recorded when in the first season, but it was reported in the Annual Report that a Club Member, Dave Marsh, became the first Bangkok Darts League player to score 180!

In the July, the British Club Golf Society decided to adopt the USGA (United States Golf Association) handicap system. This landed them in hot water a few months later with the English Ladies Golf Union who virtually accused them of cheating!

Also in July, was the start of the year for the Bill Hay Cup, a trophy donated by 1972/73 Vice-Chairman William Hay. The winner was the player with the highest six Stableford scores over a July-July year, for handicap 19 players and above.

Duting its first year, the Darts Section has been very active with a team participating in the Bangkok Darts League weekly in addition to friendly games with visiting ships crews, other darts clubs, etc. The league team has been reasonably successful and some very close games have been contested both home and away. One club member, Dave Marsh, is the only person so far in Bangkok to have scored the maximum 180 points. Well done Dave!

Staff Matter

There was a huge rise in the cost of living in Thailand during 1973, thus in January some staff at the Club were threatening to strike - a 'anonymous letter' set out grievances over poor renumeration: matters raised included low basic salaries, non-adherence to Labour Law overtime rates, low support of medical costs and need for a larger annual bonus.

An immediate pay rise of 150 Baht per month across the board was given and the remaining items put to the Finance Sub-Committee to negotiate.

Staff unrest had still not been resolved by August, when it was reported to the Committee that payment of overtime was taking around five weeks to process. The Committee set management a target of five days for such payment.

Thankfully, all was amicably resolved, and all staff members were additionally granted new uniforms with their names embroidered on them.

Colonel Hugh Docherty OBE was again Chairman and also with continued service, Mr. B.P. Thompson was elected Vice-Chairman, Mr. Trevor Whalley, served as Honorary Secretary, the Honorary Treasurer was Mr. Clive Croy, and Mel Taylor served on the committee until he left Thailand in July (see Past Participle, June 2024).

Joining this year and serving two terms were Bob Coombes, Lt. Col. John F. Davis, and Don Wyber, and, in his only term of service, James Perry.

The other "new boy" was Brian W. Heath, who in his ten terms on the Committee served three times as Chairman, twice as Vice-Chairman and was the "last" Honorary Secretary of the twentieth century ... more next month!

Club News

In January, the state of the Club's annual finances was reported. Although borrowings in 1973 had been reduced by 118,000 Baht, there was only a nominal surplus of 7,000 Baht. A number of increases to subscriptions were proposed for the AGM: Married Gentlemen from 2008 to 2508 per month, single Gentlemen from 150B to 200B, Ladies Privileges from 75B to 100B and Upcountry members from 50B to 75B. Unfortunately, this caused a huge loss in membership which dropped from 475 in February to just 402 at year end.

In the April, it was agreed that the 'Circular', a regularly produced Roneo sheet, should be replaced by a British Club Newsletter. Arthur Hawtin, a Club member, arranged for the Club to buy a Gestetner lithograph and he taught the staff how to use it. The 'British Club Newsletter' was produced, edited in the main by Lt. Col. John Davis and Don Wyber, and financed in its first year by advertising from the Hong Kong & Shanghai Banking Corporation, Commercial Union, Chartered Bank, Dunlop, New Zealand Insurance and Handy Hampers!. The first edition was produced in May 1974 to much acclaim, and this continued until the production of the first Outpost Magazine in 1980. Most editions are archived on the Club website.

OUTPOST

An inspection in late August found white ants, termites, death watch beetle and powder post beetles. This resulted in the Club being closed for four days in September whilst the whole place was seriously fumigated.

In Other News

In the February, from press stories, Australian Prime Minister, Gough Whitlam, instructed Australian diplomats in Bangkok to resign from the Club on the grounds that it was practicing racial discrimination. The story seemed to originate from when a Third Secretary at the Australian Embassy, who was not of British descent, was allegedly refused Membership, although the Club has no records of this. Three Australian Trade Commissioners did resign, but two new Australian Embassy staff also joined later in the year. During the year, David Colin Goss became the Australian Ambassador but did not join the Club but his successor the next year did. A full review of membership categories was set in motion.

On 1st June, Thai Television Channel 4 was renamed Channel 9, and transmitted in colour.

On 14th May, the General Committee agreed to allow the film crew for the 'Bond-9' movie [later named 'The Man with the Golden Gun'] to park in the Club, 6pm to 6am, for a fixed fee of 10,000 Baht. All British film crew could purchase temporary membership status.

In the September, Godfrey Lewis Hearn became the Canadian Ambassador but there is no record of his joining the Club.

The Boonmitr Building, opposite the where the Bangkok Bank is now, was built in 1974 but demolished in 2021, and is due to reopen as a mixed-use twin tower block and hotel in due course.

Finally, in the December TV Channel 7 went into colour and was rebranded as Channel 5 and the 'Bangkok Color Television' channel was rebranded Channel 7.

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












Círculo Ecuestre, Barcelona

Visited in July 2022 by Paul Doust and Prasit Jangkamol (a.k.a. Jack)























The Círculo Ecuestre, which translates into English as The Equestrian Club, was founded in 1856 by a group of middle-class Catalonians who were keen on horse riding. The club has an impressively large clubhouse in central Barcelona, with lots of facilities. There is a bar, two restaurant areas, accommodation, several lounges and function rooms, a library, a TV room, and on the roof terrace there's a gym with locker rooms and a (very) small swimming pool too. However, most facilities including the bar, restaurant and gym are only available Monday to Friday. There is a concierge 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, so accommodation is available at the weekends, albeit without breakfast on Saturdays and Sundays.

Men are required to wear a jacket in the club's main rooms such as the lounges, restaurants and the bar, but for access to the accommodation, the gym and at breakfast, jackets are not required. The club has about 1600 members, about a quarter of whom are under 40.


However, we didn't see many other people using the club during our visit, and when we had a drink in the bar one evening we were the only people there.

We stayed in this club's accommodation when we visited Barcelona on one of the first holidays that we took after the Covid pandemic. During our stay, all the staff that we met spoke English, and were all very helpful too. There was no breakfast buffet, instead breakfast had to be chosen from a menu on which there was no hot food, but it was free for people staying in the accommodation. We didn't have lunch or dinner in the club, but breakfast looked good value for people not staying in the club so perhaps lunch and dinner are good value as well. However, perhaps the best thing about the club for us was the good value of the accommodation. For just €209 (including tax) we got a suite with a separate lounge area and an ensuite bathroom. Any British Club member should consider staying in this club if they visit Barcelona.









WHY THAILAND?

I first met Colin in 1962 when we both joined the Surbiton Boy Scouts, and I was lucky enough to be his best friend for the next 62 Years! We were both privileged to grow up in the 60's and 70's undoubtedly a golden period in the UK, with the added bonus of kind and generous parents who gave us the freedom all young people crave.

Our teenage years were a whirlwind of girls, clubs, fashion, girls, motorcycles, cars and of course occasionally more girls. Most Summers were spent at the Surbiton Lagoon, a large open area swimming pool largely populated by French foreign exchange students. Of course, we spent most of our time showing off our prowess and courage diving off the high boards and chasing the French girls. The rest of the time was spent fighting with the French boys!

Summer holidays were also spent with our parents sampling the delights of Margate, Brighton, the Isle of Wight etc. interspersed with trips to Europe with our schools and Scouts. Our first trip abroad by ourselves, aged 16, was two weeks in Majorca, flights, and hotel full board ... £37! This was followed by regular trips to St Tropez on our motorbikes and then all around Europe in a motley collection of old cars! Colin went off to University and I took a Hotel and Management apprenticeship, but we vowed as soon as we finished our basic education, travel was our dream.

Thus it was that in 1973 we decided to go "around the world" with three other close friends from the UK in an assortment of trains, buses and boats ... via France, Spain, Monaco, Italy, Greece, and Croatia, we eventually arrived at the main starting point for the big adventure ... Istanbul. Here we boarded a magic hippy bus for the journey to India via Turkey, Persia, Afghanistan, and Pakistan staying in low level hotels full of hippies and hallucinatory materials Too many adventures to include here but definite

highlights were the Kabul Gorge, the Khyber Pass and living on colonial houseboats in Kashmir. Leaving the bus after several months we travelled across India by train and then a flight to paradise, Bangkok!!

After so long "roughing it" Thailand was like another world, very civilized by comparison and of course amazing people. Although we were sorry to leave, we were running low on funds, and it had always been our intention to work in the mines in Darwin.


This is where it all went a little bit pear shaped! On the train to Singapore I turned bright yellow and started evacuating liquids from every orifice ... of course I had caught the dreaded traveller's disease of that era, hepatitis, and was immediately hospitalized in the government hospital in Singapore where I was treated by conscripted soldiers but eventually repatriated by the British High Commission. At that stage we abandoned our world tour and dispersed, Colin returning to his beloved Thailand. After recovery I set up a chain of restaurants but still seeing Colin regularly on his regular trips to the UK and mine to Thailand.

In 1983, I sold my restaurants and returned to Thailand at Colin's insistence and became GM at the BC . Needless to say we had amazing adventures all round SE Asia together for the last 40 years including siring the most incredible 8 daughters between us and I would not change a minute of it!

Colin was the most amazing character who made friends wherever he went and was always a pleasure to be around. I miss him every day especially now I am working in Indonesia for a year without family or friend.




Chituary

Colin Robert Hastings

11 September 1950 – 29 April 2024, RIP

Eulogy by Dominic Faulder read at his cremation, 4 May 2024




Colin died suddenly on Monday afternoon in Bang Saray near Sattahip in Chonburi province when he suffered heart failure and the car, he was driving collided with a wall. Emergency services were unable to revive him, and he was declared dead at the scene at around 3.15pm. There were no other casualties, and his body was taken for autopsy from Sattahip Police Station to the Institute of Forensic Medicine at the Bangkok Police Hospital, where the cause of death was confirmed.

He was 73 and had always been in great shape, so his sudden demise was the cause of widespread dismay. It was reported in The Sun and Daily Mail in London, and even the Le Petit Journal in Bangkok took note: "Colin Hastings, le papa du magazine Big Chilli nous a quittés," it announced.

"Colin, you are 8 years younger than me and had no business passing before me. I will miss you greatly," Dean Barrett, the author and former editor of Sawasdee, Thai International's inflight, posted. "We boxed a charity boxing match at the Dusit Thani (he won)," Barrett recalled. "And when the final bell rang and the referee got us together for a brief hug before the decision, Colin whispered in my ear, 'Thank God that's over,' and I replied, 'You know it, brother.'


Just six days ago, Colin had been his usual cheery self-circulating among Sunday diners at Chesa, Bangkok's popular Swiss restaurant. He was a member of the Sunday club, an informal group of long-term expat residents who gather every Sunday afternoon in the nearby Royal Oak. "I'm not sure Sundays will ever be the same," said one.











A veteran British journalist with Fleet Street subbing experience in his early 20s, Colin arrived in Bangkok in September 1974. He worked at the Bangkok Post from 1975 to 1980, when he returned to the UK and worked as a subeditor at The Sunday Times, a flagship newspaper then under the helm Harold Evans – one of the great editors of the 20th century whose journalism manuals are still regarded by many as bibles.

Colin returned to Thailand and spent a year in the Media Transasia stable, editing travel trade and listings publications and battling a chaotic art room where typesetting was done with an IBM Golfball machine by a typesetter called 'Buert' who did not speak a word of English.

That was where I first met Colin in 1982, and everybody was still thumping out copy on ancient typewriters. I was editing Living in Thailand, a monthly general interest/lifestyle magazine. We all worked in windowless offices down a narrow corridor, Colin just over the way, and we had to acquire multiple pseudonyms to make up for the acute shortage of writers. I had ten, at least.



Lunchtimes more than made up for the relentless deadlines and steep, cross-cultural learning curves. Other Media Transasia colleagues included Ken Barrett who decades later produced the seminal '22 walks in Bangkok: Exploring the city's back lanes and byways'; travel guru Vijay Verghese who moved to Business Traveller and greater things in travel publishing in Hong Kong; Italian photographers Luca Invernizzi Tettoni and Alberto Cassio with their medium format Pentaxes and almost mafia grip on fashion, arts and culture photography in Bangkok; prolific travel writer John Hoskin; and the remarkable art director Kristiaan Inwood.

It was probably Colin who came up with the irreverent acronym VOMIT for Veterans of Media Transasia, but that scene was actually in many ways part of a much happier media landscape. Southeast Asia and Hong Kong were awash with English-language publications where young, ambitious journalists could get work experience, some income and the vital by-lines that would transport them to better things.

"Indeed, the list of English language magazines that once packed local bookshops and graced countless coffee tables is long, and now a distant memory," Colin reminisced in 2021. "Who remembers Caravan, Metro, Living in Thailand, Time Out, The Magazine, Farang, Look East, Travel & Leisure, Sport, Traversing the Orient and AsiaLife?" he asked.

"All of these were home to some great editors, writers, designers, and a host of creative minds, not to mention the many behind-the-scenes people such as printers,

messengers, sales teams and office staff. Have they all found new employment in the online media revolution? I doubt it," he wrote.

Colin always moved surefootedly from one journalistic steppingstone to the next. An exceptionally hard worker, he multitasked with tremendous efficiency and understatement – taking on not just writing and editing, but layout and design, and in his later years managing sales and marketing. I can think of nobody in this part of the world with the skills set that Colin brought to Big Chilli.

He nevertheless ended up with four Facebook pages, so evidently found aspects of social media vexing. Colin was also curiously susceptible to online conspiracy theories, for which he was frequently ribbed by his old friend Richard Holt, a former FCCT general manager, and others.

Colin was part of the founding editorial team of the regional publication Tourism Asia in the 1990s, the forerunner of today's Travel Weekly Asia. "Well-known in travel media circles, he covered the annual ASEAN Tourism Forums in [the] early days, played a pivotal role in promoting various Visit Thailand Year campaigns through his Big Chilli magazine, and was a familiar figure covering the annual marketing conferences of Thailnternational and the Tourism Authority of Thailand" wrote Don Ross, editor of TTR Weekly.

He launched Thailand Tatler in September 1991 after the Bangkok Post acquired the local license, and served as its managing editor for the next seven years. "It was a challenge I relished, particularly as Tatler was the first of many local versions of international magazines like Elle, Cleo, and Vogue to enter the Thai market soon after. It was an exciting period for magazine publishers, and we all expected it to last forever."

























In late 1999, Colin struck out on his own launching Big Chilli. "It was a slightly irreverent monthly magazine with lots of gossip, edgy news, tongue-in-cheek articles, parties, profiles and restaurant reviews," Colin later recalled.

"Big Chilli was quickly adopted by foreigners who didn't identify with the local hi-so scene," said Colin. "I think it is fair to say that Big Chilli is very much part of the fabric of expat society in Thailand. An institution, if you like."

Colin himself was an institution. His Tatler and Big Chilli personas made him arguably the best-known foreign journalist in Thailand, and certainly the most popular. He might attend three parties or events in an evening, changing his clothes in the car park if need be. I doubt if there is a person in this room who had not seen him

with magazines balanced on one arm and a camera in the other hand as he navigated a room getting the job done smoothly and engagingly.

"I knew Colin over several decades and through various incarnations as a journalist," recalled Denis Gray, a former FCCT president and long-time bureau chief of The Associated Press in Bangkok.

"I don't ever remember him losing his cheerfulness, zest for life and appetite for hard work. When he launched Big Chilli, I predicted that at a time when print media was on a downward slope the magazine would soon expire. How wrong I was. It did change my mind seeing Colin racing around town doing the work of half a dozen with boyish enthusiasm. Good-bye Colin and hope you'll find a great pub up yonder."




















80th Anniversary of D-Day

Day Trip to Nakhon Nayok: 30th May 2024

After arrival at the Club a number of travellers decided it best to wait out the storm in the Sala, enjoying the restorative powers of beer, cider, etc.

One of the most significant initiatives is the Junior Squash Academy. This academy aims to nurture young talent and bring new members into the club, ensuring the future of the squash section.


Conclusion


